MAKING A DIFFERENCE

ince the start of the campaign more than 45,000 donors representing 130,000 Catholics across the Diocese of Pittsburgh have made 552,993 outright gifts and pledge payments. Together, our sacrifices are creating a historic and positive impact through *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*

To date **\$130 million** has been received toward multiyear pledges totaling \$233.3 million to address extraordinary needs — to strengthen parishes, invigorate evangelization, revitalize sacramental life, support education and formation in the faith, train clergy and lay leaders, and serve the poor and marginalized.

Such sacrificial support has allowed churches to be constructed or renovated, as parishes are receiving the largest single portion of campaign funds.

Campaign funds are helping to meet needs diocesan-wide:

- Thousands of students in Catholic elementary and secondary schools are receiving additional tuition assistance through a 60 percent increase in the Bishop's Education Fund, and every Catholic high school in the Diocese has been awarded a technology grant to improve security and enhance 21st century learning environments.
- The growing number of retired diocesan priests will have more housing options with an expansion and upgrade of the **St. John Vianney Manor** retirement home.
- A **new evangelization initiative** is underway across the Diocese, bringing parishioners closer to Jesus and helping them better serve their parishes and communities.
- More clergy and lay leaders are receiving pastoral training through the **Good Leaders**, **Good Shepherds** and **Tending the Talents** courses.
- The poor, the marginalized, our disadvantaged neighbors are receiving much-needed medical and dental care through **Catholic Charities Free Health Care Center**. Expectant and new single mothers are receiving shelter, counseling and training through Catholic Charities' **Roselia Fund**.

All funds are being used only for the purposes described in the diocesan and parish case statements under the watchful oversight of the campaign board and pastors. Campaign expenses remain low at less than 7 percent, thanks to thousands of volunteers who helped to secure the gifts.

ON MISSION FOR THE CHURCH ALIVE!

Stewardship and Discipleship

he diocesan-wide planning initiative On Mission for The Church Alive!

invites each of us to envision how our parishes, schools and ministries can best respond to the changes in our communities so they can be vital centers of worship and service, and deepen people's relationship with Jesus.

The campaign is helping set the stage for the On Mission initiative by addressing the **extraordinary needs** of our local Church. The focus of the campaign has been Catholic education and catechesis; formation and evangelization; and stewardship and charitable needs, which are vital for the Church's mission. The campaign also supports important **parish projects**, with many gifts being used for long-deferred **repair and maintenance**.

Our parishes are undergoing significant changes. From 2000 to 2015 Mass attendance in the Diocese decreased 40 percent, while sacramental participation declined 40 to 50 percent. Half of all parishes now experience operational deficits, and by 2025, the number of diocesan priests available for active ministry is expected to decrease from about 200 priests to 112.

These numbers reflect the reality that many people have lost their connection to Jesus and the Church. That is why **On Mission for The Church Alive!** is first and foremost about **sharing our faith in Jesus** with everyone we meet. We must help our parishes, schools and every faith community have the resources necessary to ensure vibrant worship and service. The campaign is a vital, effective tool for ensuring the success of that approach.



Creating Community for Youth and Seniors

Sharpsburg

More young people have been wandering the streets and drug use is on the rise, so **Father Michael Decewicz** knew he had to do something for his community.

The pastor of **St. Juan Diego Parish** in Sharpsburg reached out to Dirty Vagabond Ministries, a Christ-centered urban youth program that embraces Pope Francis' preference for "a church that is dirty because it's been on the streets."

Well-trained missionaries are considered to be "vagabonds" who work with at-risk teens.

"We're seeing a second generation of children who are unchurched," Father Decewicz said. "We want to give them a sense of self-worth and hope."

The parish also amended its campaign case statement, repurposing funds earmarked for renovating a community center to expand outreach to the needy, homebound elderly and youth and young adults of St. Juan Diego Parish. Father Decewicz and his parishioners are teaching by example what it means to be *The Church Alive*!

Greene County

At the far southern end of our Diocese, five parishes in **Greene County** are able to reach out to youth and seniors with campaign resources provided through the generosity of their sisters and brothers.

The assistance comes through a diocesan campaign fund that helps struggling parishes in areas where the Church must remain present. This grant supports outreach to the elderly, poor and homeless, as well as shared religious education, including county-wide confirmation, youth development and retreats. Events such as attending a Pirates game (above) help build community among parishes.

Emergency warming centers are being built at St. Ann in Waynesburg, St. Ignatius of Antioch in Bobtown and St. Thomas (St. Marcellus social hall) in Clarksville to serve as storm shelters.

"We are focused on outreach and collaboration," said **Deacon Tom Raymond**, deacon administrator of the parishes, which also include St. Hugh in Carmichaels and Our Lady of Consolation in Nemacolin.



GIFTS TO DATE

As of December 31, 2016, of the \$233.3 million pledged to *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*, Inc., **\$130 million (56%)** in payments has been received. Charitable grants totaling more than \$39 million have been awarded since the start of the campaign — **\$20.3 million** in 2016 alone (see pages 4–5).

Funds will continue to be returned to parishes across our Diocese as gifts are received and accounts reconciled.

ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY

The volunteer board of directors of *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*, Inc., is focusing on earning donor trust through accountability and transparency in all that they do.

Directors oversee the policies, procedures and practices of managing the funds raised in the campaign. Receiving recommendations from the Grant Review Committee, the board evaluates grant applications, ensuring the requests align with the diocesan case for support.

Pastors and administrators also verify that campaign funds are being spent according to their authorized parish case statements, assuring donors that funds are being used as promised. If changes are necessary, the people in the pews hear from their pastor and councils what those modifications are and why they are necessary.

Examples of Impact

- A campaign grant is providing support to parents whose children have hearing loss. The DePaul School for Hearing & Speech in Pittsburgh is now able to offer more need-based scholarships for students in their toddler and upper elementary programs. DePaul is the only listening and spoken language school in the tri-state area.
- Safe housing is being provided for single mothers and their babies at **Catholic Charities Roselia Apartments**. Moms take classes in pregnancy and infant care, learning how to become more effective parents while receiving help from caseworkers to obtain employment and achieve stability in their lives with their children.
- More Catholics are seeking to return to full sacramental participation in the Church. Thanks to support from *Church Alive!* donors, Bishop Zubik eliminated all fees for those seeking a marriage annulment in our Diocese. Pope Francis has made it clear that marriage is indissoluble and should be seen as a gift, but he also stressed that not all failed marriages or remarriages are the same, urging divorced Catholics to repair their relationship with the Church.
- Catholic Charities Free Health Care Center has been able to quadruple the number of dental patients seen every year, thanks to a campaign grant that helps to underwrite the cost for a full-time dentist. The center provides free, comprehensive dental and medical care to uninsured and underinsured patients, regardless of religious affiliation.

THE VALUE OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION

ore struggling families and their children enrolled in Catholic schools will be benefiting from a dramatic increase in need-based tuition assistance, and all 12 Catholic high schools in the Diocese are upgrading facility security and technology thanks to campaign grants.

Average grant awards for tuition assistance have increased from about \$140 in 1995-96 to nearly \$1,000 in the current school year. The Campaign has allocated \$12 million to the Bishop's Education Fund; approximately \$7 million was added in 2016 alone.

Meanwhile, continuing to improve technology remains a top priority. All 12 Catholic high schools in the Diocese will share in \$3.7 million in campaign grants to provide cybersecurity, tech-based physical plant security, and upgraded networks and technology infrastructure.

The funding will enable the schools to meet current and future curriculum and educational goals, providing shared learning within a campus, among and between schools, and globally.

Families benefit from need-based scholarships to St. Anthony School Programs, which provide an inclusive Catholic education to students with Down syndrome, autism and other disabilities.

Academic studies and vocational training are offered to more than 120 St. Anthony students at Mary of Nazareth, St. Thomas More, St. Therese of Lisieux and St. Mary of the Assumption schools;

Bishop Canevin, Serra Catholic and Cardinal Wuerl North Catholic high schools; and Duquesne University.

Duquesne students work closely with the St. Anthony kids as job coaches,

Caring for Our Senior and Retired Priests

After laboring in the Lord's vineyard in service of the Church and its people, retired priests of the Diocese soon will have a larger, updated home.

St. John Vianney Manor in Crafton is being renovated and expanded, thanks to the support of *Church Alive!* donors. The Diocese currently has about 100 retired priests, with many more expected to join them in the coming years as the large ordination classes of the 1960s and early 1970s approach retirement.

Four new residential suites are being constructed, for a total of 36 suites. Another 20 could be added in the future. Renovations also include a new kitchen, dining and living rooms, exercise facility, HVAC system and elevator. Individual rooms will include safety features for bathrooms.

"We are quite grateful to campaign donors for their heartfelt response to the needs of these good men who have faithfully served the Church," said **Father Philip Przybyla**, director of St. John Vianney Manor.

Evangelization Effort to Deepen, Spread Faith

pilot evangelization initiative is underway in 13 parishes across the Diocese, thanks to campaign funding. The goal of this three-year initiative is to help spur growth in discipleship in four stages: encountering Christ, growing in faith, discerning one's gifts and answering the call to mission.

Parishioners meet in small groups to deepen their formation, assess needs in their parishes and communities, and develop plans to meet those needs.

The parishes taking part are: St. Maria Goretti, Pittsburgh; St. Gabriel of the Sorrowful Virgin, Whitehall; Mary, Mother of the Church, Our Lady of the Valley, and St. Damien of Molokai, Mon Valley; Immaculate Conception, Washington; St. Patrick, Canonsburg; Our Lady of Fatima, Hopewell Township; St. Frances Cabrini, Center Township; and St. Wendelin, St. John, Mater Dolorosa and St. Joseph in Butler County.

Based on the experiences and evaluation of these parishes, other faith communities throughout the Diocese will have an opportunity to join in.

Equipping Leaders for the Mission

Leadership development programs funded by *The Church Alive!* are helping to prepare God's people for a future when there will be a greater need for trained lay leaders in ministry.

Campaign funding is making possible the **Good Leaders**, **Good Shepherds** program for clergy and the **Tending the Talents** companion course for lay staff and pastoral council members in parishes.

The programs cover decision-making, problem-solving, how to give effective feedback and conflict resolution. Participants also learn their own leadership behavior styles, how to create a vision for a role and leading teams.

"As good shepherds with the heart of Christ, many of our priests are committed to leading parishes of missionary disciples," said **Father Joseph Mele**, diocesan secretary for leadership development.
