YOU ARE THE DIFFERENCE


Faithful donors to *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!* are seeing their sacrificial gifts bear fruit across the six counties of the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

More than 45,000 families and individuals representing about 130,000 Catholics have made gifts to the campaign totaling more than **\$166 million**. Funds are addressing extraordinary needs—to strengthen parishes, support education and formation in the faith, revitalize sacramental life, invigorate evangelization, train clergy and lay leaders, and serve the poor and marginalized.

Donations are staying in your parish and working for the entire Church of Pittsburgh, with 19 new grants and distributions approved in 2018:

- **Parishes have received \$76 million**, collectively 152 percent of what they originally were anticipating, providing funds for priority projects that include capital needs and ministry programs.
- A groundbreaking **discipleship program** has been launched to help Catholics grow closer to Jesus and lead others to Him.
- Your support is helping to train leaders who are expanding **Young Adult Ministry** in their parishes or regions.
- More grants have been made to **Parishes in Need**, including for youth ministry, outreach to young people in inner-city neighborhoods, and preserving parish sacramental records.
- Pastoral support of **Hispanic Catholics**, whose presence continues to grow in the diocese.

All funds are used only for the purposes described in the diocesan and parish case statements, and campaign expenses remain low at less than seven percent, thanks to some 2,000 volunteers who helped to secure gifts.



Addiction Recovery Ministry

With more families and individuals being overwhelmed by the opioid epidemic, the Church of Pittsburgh is taking a pastoral approach to provide help.

Sacrificial gifts from donors to *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!* are providing support through a grant to help establish a diocesan-wide **Addiction Recovery Ministry** at St. Juan Diego Parish in Sharpsburg. The parish center will host 12-step recovery meetings, prayer and Bible study groups, and educational forms, with referrals to community resources. Special Masses and anointing of the sick also will be offered.

Developed by **Father Michael Decewicz**, who has been open about his recovery from alcoholism, the program will provide a one-on-one ministry for abusers and their family and friends, while also supporting clergy, school principals, directors of religious education, and pastoral associates who are offering assistance.

Allegheny County recorded 735 overdose deaths in 2017, the third straight year of a record number of fatal overdoses. Cases also have risen dramatically in Butler and Lawrence counties.

“The paramount dynamic of our ministry is spiritual—how we manifest and respond to the love of God,” said psychologist and author **William Kraft**, who serves on the addiction recovery ministry team. “It works well for *The Church Alive*.”

On Mission to Build Up the Church

After intensive prayer, study and consultation that began in April 2015, the *On Mission for The Church Alive!* revitalization initiative has entered the implementation phase.

Effective last October, Bishop Zubik organized the diocese’s 188 parishes into 57 groupings that eventually will become new, multi-site parishes.

At the same time, new Mass and confession schedules went into effect on an interim basis as priests and deacons began their assignments in parishes, hospitals, nursing homes, high schools, colleges, religious motherhouses, correctional institutions, and special ministry.

Effective religious education and evangelization are key to *On Mission*, forming the next generation of lay leaders who will collaborate with clergy to help rejuvenate our faith communities.

Our Campaign for The Church Alive! continues to provide critical resources to help strengthen parishes and ministries for the mission, offering a deeper relationship with Jesus and the Church to practicing and inactive Catholics, as well as those who have never been baptized.

Safeguarding Your Gift


An independently administered **Survivors’ Compensation Program** has been established to aid those who were abused by members of our diocesan clergy, and is funded through the sale of diocesan properties. **No money used for this fund or related legal expenses will come from *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*, Parish Share, parishes, schools, Catholic Charities, or any other funds designated for specific use by donors.**

The volunteer board of directors of *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*, Inc. continues to safeguard all gifts, using them responsibly and ensuring accountability and transparency in communicating with donors.

In December 2018, the board’s Audit Committee reported a clean audit by the public accounting firm Maher Duessel, which noted that donors’ intentions are being honored.

In addition, administrators confirm that the parish portion of campaign funds is being applied only in accord with approved parish case statements. If any case changes are needed, a formal approval process is required.

GIFTS TO DATE

Of the \$234 million pledged to *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*, Inc., **\$166.6 million** in payments has been received to date. The volunteer board overseeing these funds has awarded charitable grants totaling more than **\$53.6 million** since the start of the campaign (see pages 4-5).

Parishes have received \$76 million for their local case statement priorities.* Funds will continue to be returned to parishes across our Diocese as gifts are received and accounts reconciled.

Examples of Your Impact

- Donors' sacrificial gifts are funding an innovative **formation and evangelization** effort across the diocese. The School of Missionary Discipleship will help Catholics grow in the faith and lead others to Jesus through a three-phase process. **Ignite!** lights the fire of revitalization in parishes through spiritual awakening experiences such as Alpha and Christlife; **On Fire!** is an in-depth spiritual formation program, and **Equip!** will train volunteers for specific leadership roles, including catechesis, hospitality, pastoral care, and social outreach, supporting clergy and lay ecclesial ministers.
- **Catholic Charities Free Health Care Center** completed a **modernization of medical services** that included a new electronic health records system, updated operational procedures, and expanded training. The center in downtown Pittsburgh serves as a **safety net of care** for the homeless, uninsured, and medically underserved. Primary and specialty services include physical examinations, medications, eye exams and glasses, dental cleanings, X-rays, fillings, and root canals.
- Sixty-five years ago, a Pittsburgh priest, **Father Jules Roos**, founded a maternity hospital and wellness clinic serving the poor of **Chimbote, Peru**. In 2019, the 100,000th baby will be born in that hospital. The wellness clinic he founded to serve 25 patients now helps more than 1,000 patients each day. *Church Alive!* funds have helped to expand and modernize these services. *Muchas gracias, Pittsburgh!*



Bringing Jesus to At-risk Youth

An inner-city ministry that's bringing young people to Jesus is expanding in 2019.

Missionaries from **Vagabond Ministries** will begin outreach in Pittsburgh's Allentown section this summer, and in the Hill District in 2020.

The missionaries have been helping youth exposed to drugs and violence in Pittsburgh's Garfield, Bloomfield, and Friendship neighborhoods, and in Sharpsburg.

Sacrificial gifts to **Our Campaign for The Church Alive!** provided start-up grants for the ministry. The vagabond reference is tied to Jesus, who lived as a wandering preacher during his public ministry, and to his followers, who journey as vagabonds to their true home, heaven.

Supported by trained volunteers, missionaries meet teens where they are, whether on basketball courts, in housing projects, or in schools that partner with the ministry.

Young people are mentored and taught the faith, attending worship nights, Bible studies, retreats, and mission trips. Some are attending church regularly for the first time in their lives, and several have expressed interest in becoming Catholic.



Supporting Latino Catholics

With the **Latino presence growing** in our region, the diocese is providing pastoral support to keep their Catholic culture strong.

Campaign funds will support a catechetical director to teach the faith in all Latino parishes, and promote spiritual formation programs. Spanish-language Masses are held at St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Pittsburgh's Beechview neighborhood, St. Regis in Oakland, Our Lady of Joy in Plum, St. Paul in Butler, and Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal in Meadow Lands.

The grant also provides training for volunteer catechists, young adult leaders, promoting religious vocations, and improving communications. It also allowed five representatives from the local Latino community to attend a national meeting for Hispanic/Latino ministry to learn best practices.



Raising Up Young Leaders

There are more than 530,000 people in their 20s and 30s in southwestern Pennsylvania, about 125,000 of whom are Catholic, and many are looking for meaning in life.

To better connect with young adults and help make disciples, a new training program called **Cultivate** is being launched in the diocese, thanks to support from *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!*

The effort will provide leaders with the knowledge and skills to **implement young adult ministry** in their parishes or region.

It will help them understand the needs of younger Catholics who are looking for something deeper, including a life with Christ.

In the past, many young people drifted away from the church during their high school and college years, but returned to the faith when they married and started families. That is not always the case today.

A **Gallup report** titled “How Millennials Want to Work and Live” found young adults are less attached to religious affiliations, but are optimistic and want a purpose in life.

Diocesan surveys of parishioners indicated their top concern is helping young people reconnect with and grow in the faith.

Parishes Benefit The Most

When *Our Campaign for The Church Alive!* officially kicked off in December 2012, Bishop Zubik set a target of raising **\$50 million** to address the extraordinary needs of parishes, the single largest portion of the funds.

Parishes have received **\$76 million** to date for their local case statement priorities. Many parishes have invested in **capital projects** relating to long-deferred building repair and maintenance, but donations also have supported **ministry**. These include faith formation programs, youth ministry, evangelization, outreach to needy families, and communications.



Listening and Learning

The DePaul School for Hearing and Speech is able to help more children as soon as they’re diagnosed with hearing loss, thanks to a campaign grant.

The early intervention program helps connect parents to resources and lets them know they’re not alone. More than two-thirds of DePaul students have a cochlear implant—a small electronic device that replaces the function of the damaged inner ear to provide sound signals to the brain.

Founded in 1908 by the Diocese of Pittsburgh and the Sisters of Charity of Seton Hill, DePaul is the only listening and spoken language school in the tri-state region for students who are deaf or hard of hearing.
